Responding to 1NT

These days, most play a 15-17 1NT, which may have a 5-card major, though some stick with the older "wide-range" 15-18, or even the older still 16-18.

The easy responses are the major transfers, so 2♦ for hearts, 2♥ for spades.

Could be zero points, in which case it's better for partner's strong hand to be declarer.

Invitational hands can transfer then follow up with 2NT on a balanced 8-9 points, or three of the major with six of them.

To transfer then bid a new suit at the 3-level is forcing to game.

♠ 65 **♥** KJ653 **♦** A742 **♣** 102

This hand transfers to hearts, then invites with 2NT. The hand is not strong enough to show the diamonds. 3♦ would be game-forcing.

If the ◆2 were a small heart, the rebid would be 3♥, showing six of them.

What is a 2♠ response to 1NT? Not spades! That would be pointless. If your partner agrees, you can use a 2♠ response as a transfer to **clubs**.

2♣ is "simple" Stayman, where the only responses are $2 \diamondsuit / \blacktriangledown / \diamondsuit$, with $2 \diamondsuit$ denying a 4-card major.

Stayman is usually 8+ points but could be a weak, shapely hand looking to escape from 1NT:

♠ K1043 **♥** Q54 **♦** J8754 **♣** 6

Bid 2♣ Stayman, then pass opener's rebid. That rates to find a better spot than 1NT.

The usual way to ask for aces after a 1NT is 4♣ Gerber, not 4NT, which is best played as a natural invitation to slam. for instance:

♠ A1094 ♥ AK6 ♦ AQ32 ♣ 82

After partner opens 1NT, you start with Stayman 2♣. If partner bids 2♠, you can just bid 6♠. The points are there with the fit.

If partner rebids 2♦ or 2♥, what then? 15+17 = 32. The answer is to bid 4NT as a natural invitation to 6NT.

Advanced extras

If you agree with the idea of using 2♠ as a transfer to clubs, what do you do if you want to show long diamonds?

Here is where it gets a bit murky. Rather than using 34 to show diamonds, the expert method is to use 2NT as a transfer to diamonds. That means giving up 2NT as an invitational raise, so you have to do something else with that hand. What?

Well, you could start with 2♣ Stayman, then bid 2NT to say you weren't looking for a major after all, just showing 8-9 balanced.

Another idea is to use a 2♠ response as either clubs or a raise to 2NT. That way, a hand that bids 2♣ Stayman will always have a four-card major.

3♣ is now free for another purpose. Common in the expert world is to use it as "5-card Stayman". After all, if you allow a 1NT with a 5-card major, it would be good to have a sure fire way to find a 5-3 major fit.
