Teacher is Nick Hughes

When? Three consecutive Tuesdays, commencing on the 4th February.

What Time? Be seated by about 12:30 pm Where? The Bondi Room, Easts Leagues Club

Do I need a partner? No, you can just turn up. How much will it cost? Table money of \$15 per lesson, that is all you pay.

The Course Content?

Consolidate your Card Play. Week 1. Setting up a suit in dummy, card combinations. Week 2. Repeating finesses, trick one Week 3. Delaying trumps

all the lessons? –

Obviously, you will benefit from each of the lessons but there is no compulsion to attend more Tuesdays than you might wish.

Format of the lessons

(a) instruction as to the theory, (b) play pre-dealt boards (c) printed record available of the lessons and the boards played.



<mark>The Next Beginner's</mark> <u>Course</u> starts on Tuesday 3rd March. _{The}

course includes 4 weeks of lessons followed by 2 weeks of supervised play, all under the watchful eye of your teacher, Nick Hughes. The cost of the course is \$70 (or \$40 for seniors), easily the best value in town. As part of the "package" the participants are provided with a "first book of bridge" and, also, 6 months membership of Easts Bridge Club. Brochures are available from the director's table or from Committee Members. I encourage you to have your friends and family members attend and learn this game that continues to give us all so much enjoyment. Completed enrolment forms can be left at the Club or with the bridge director.

What do our graduates Say?

After a 40- year absence from playing friendly bridge the beginners' course at Easts Bridge club caught my eye. What a delight.

The room had in excess of 20 participants, many being absolute beginners and some returners like myself. All were welcoming, and there was no difficulty finding willing partners to play with.

Our instructor was not only wise but patient. We were taken through examples collectively as a class then given boards to play, each having been constructed to capitalise on the lesson. Each week was built on the previous week 'till after 4 weeks we joined the larger weekly bridge games. (With appropriate leniency and support) The tuition, patience and knowledge exhibited by the tutors\masters has been exemplary. The pupils, all accepting of one another, it has been an enjoyable and embracing experience. The Rule of Twenty

Most of us open the bidding if we have 12 or more high card points in our hand. The Rule of Twenty is a guideline that you can follow

to open a hand with less than twelve high card points.

You can open a hand with the Rule of Twenty if the total of the number of high card points in your hand plus the number of cards in your two longest suits is equal to or greater than twenty.

For example, if you had ten high card points and six hearts and four diamonds you could open one heart.

The Rule of Twenty was developed by Marty Bergen, and has been enhanced by Ron Klinger

To use of the Rule of Twenty:

- Have the total of your high card points and the number of cards in your two longest suits equal or greater than twenty to open the bidding
- Have most your high card points in the two longest suits
- Have at least two 'quick tricks' in your hand
- Be in the first or second seat, not the third or fourth seat
