West leads the heart two and the trick is won by South's king. Declarer continues by leading the spade seven, three from West, five from dummy, and East follows with the six. (Cover up the defender's hands and make your plan for the remainder of South's play).

With the spades neatly under control, it is time to minimise the number of minor suit losers. In view of West's opening bid, the diamond ace is marked and poor West can be subjected to a coup known as Morton's Fork. (Morton's Fork forces an opponent to choose between; letting declarer establish extra tricks in the suit led; or, losing the opportunity to win any trick in the suit led).

South cashes the heart queen and then leads the small diamond from hand. If West ducks, South wins the king in dummy, discards the diamond queen on the heart ace, and plays ace and another club. This enables declarer to ruff two clubs in dummy, for eleven tricks.

If West rises with the diamond ace, it does not help the defence. Then the king and jack of diamonds, together with the heart ace will provide discards for three of declarer's clubs, and South again comes to eleven tricks.

The Hammond Electric Bridge Table.

Invented by Laurens Hammond, (of Hammond Organ fame), was released somewhere before Christmas in 1932. At first glance, it looks more like a spiritualist gadget that you might have used to fake a séance – but not quite. What it actually does is automatic card shuffling. Players insert a deck of cards, which is fed through to the internal mechanism of the table. There, the cards are distributed to the players at random (instead of shuffling the entire deck). World's greatest boon to tired Bridge players! Apparently, it didn't sell too well at the time, and was largely considered an over-the-top gadget.
