## THE VONDRACEK PHENOMENON

In 1956, Felix Vondracek wrote in The Bridge World Magazine that when choosing between two trump suits of the same length, it often pays to choose the weaker suit. This deal illustrates the point:

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Two wives are discussing how badly their respective husbands had played the previous evening - each convinced that their husband plays worse than the other. The first wife says, "Just let me tell you what happened last night. My husband was playing 7NT, vulnerable, with 12 top tricks and he needed to make a spade finesse for 13 . Dummy had the AQ of spades and he had a couple of small ones in hand, the finesse was onside. So, what do you think he did? He took the first 11 tricks and ended up in dummy with the AQ of spades and then led the Queen from dummy at trick 12!"
"So, what's so bad about that" says wife number two "Against my husband that play works!"
