## At the Recent Spring Nationals

A number of our members played in the Spring Nationals Congress at Canterbury Racecourse, one of the major events in the bridge calendar in Australia. Our directors, Nick and Nicoleta, won the Rainbow Pairs. Our members including Theo, Leigh, Lis, Thomas, Chris, and Wally performed credibly in other events. There are events at bridge congresses for all players, including those classed as Restricted or Novice players. The next major Congress is the Summer Festival of Bridge in Canberra in January.

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Zia Mahmood, arguably the world's most flamboyant bridge player, rose in a few short years from an unknown rubber bridge player to the world's most charismatic bridge star!

Having decided to try the world of tournament bridge, Zia's initial sortie was at Juan-les-Pins on the Cote d'Azur in the South of France. Zia resolved to avoid the mixed pairs as he preferred to be seduced by what he termed the best food on earth. (Bouillabaisse, the fish soup, which is a specialty of the Cote d'Azur, is wonderful beyond description.) But it was difficult for (3) Take that! them to get to four spades when not only one but **both** opponents had bid spades. (4) S(t)ucker.

We moved up 140 places, finishing a respectable 40<sup>th</sup>. Monique was delighted. I was delighted that Monique was delighted! And the love affair?

I suppose you could say that we celebrated our success in the usual manner.
